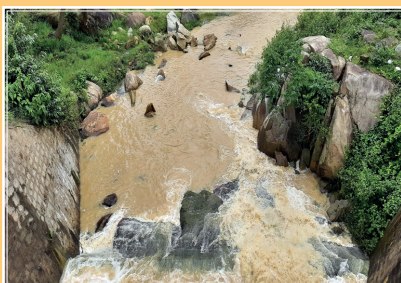

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## THE EMBLEM

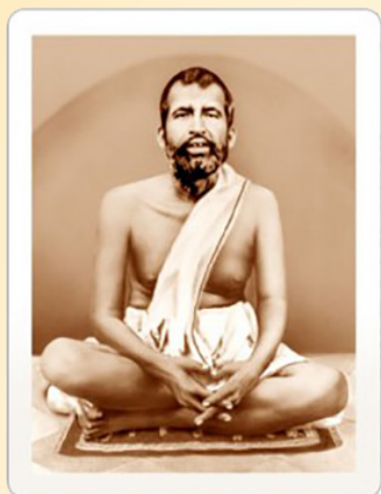

## **Ramakrishna Mission TB Sanatorium**

### **1.1 Introduction:**

The Ramakrishna Mission, a widely acclaimed spiritual organization of international repute, having its headquarters at Belur Math, Howrah, West Bengal, India, was founded by Swami Vivekananda in May 1897 as an instrument for the dissemination of Sri Ramakrishna's lofty spiritual teachings and the rich cultural heritage of India. The Mission's goal is to achieve this by translating its ideals into practical activities for the elevation of humanity irrespective of caste, creed, religion and nationality, looking upon people as the veritable manifestation of the Divine. Swamiji's aims and ideals found pithy expression in his utterance that he made before the members of the Mission, monastic and lay, namely 'Atmano Mokshartham Jagaddhitaya Cha', for one's own spiritual liberation and for the well-being of the world.

The Ramakrishna Mission was registered on 4th May, 1909 under the Societies Registration Act (Act XXI of 1860 revised according to the West Bengal Act XXVI of 1961) and its registration no. is S/ 917 of 1909-10. The Mission branches are spread all over India and abroad also.

As mentioned earlier, the ideal that the Ramakrishna Mission stands for is liberation of the self and the well-being of the world. Its aim is to practice and preach the Sanatana Dharma or the Eternal Religion as embodied in the lives and teachings of Sri Ramakrishna, Sri Maa Sarada Devi and Swami Vivekananda, while its motto is renunciation and service and harmony of the religions. Its method is work is worship. The service activities of the Ramakrishna Mission include worship, training of monastic aspirants, preaching, dissemination of general and technical education with an ethical and spiritual background, medical service, famine and distress relief work, rural uplift, work among the toiling and emerging people of all classes and cultural background etc.



## **1.2 How the Sanatorium came into existence:**

### **A Brief History**

More than eight decades ago the idea of starting a Tuberculosis Sanatorium was conceived by some monks of the Ramakrishna Order and the first contribution of Rs. 500 towards its implementation was sent by a swami of the same Order who was at that time preaching Vedanta in the West. But for various reasons not much progress could be made with the plan. A fresh effort was, however, made in 1937 and a couple of years later, at the instance of Shri Jawaharlal Nehru, Dr. Rajendra Prasad succeeded in securing for the present Sanatorium a large plot of land at Dungri (Ranchi) measuring about 240 acres. Subsequently another 45 acres were acquired. Then a donation of Rs.25,000 for the Sanatorium came from Mr Victor Narayan Vidyanta of Lucknow. That was the humble first step.

Unfortunately, however, there came a spell of forced inaction as a result of the Second World War. It was only some years after the termination of the war that substantial donations started coming. Mrs. K C Roy of Ranchi donated Rs.25,000 to perpetuate the memory of her deceased husband. Srimat Swami Vishuddhanandaji Maharaj, the then Vice-President of the Ramakrishna Order, laid the foundation-stone of the Sanatorium in 1948. Capital grants of Rs.100,000 and Rs.50,000 were then received from the Government of India and the state government of Bihar respectively. With the help of this it was possible to give the Sanatorium a concrete shape and on 27 January 1951, the Sanatorium was formally declared open by Dr Anugrah Narain Sinha, the then Hon'ble Finance Minister of the Government of Bihar.

The Sanatorium is situated on a picturesque plot of land to the East of Ranchi – Chaibasa Road at an altitude of 2,100 ft and is only 7 kilo meters away from the Hatia Railway Station and 16 kilo meters from the Ranchi Railway Station. The area is dry and dust-free and is covered with Sal trees and surrounded by small hills. Throughout the year the place enjoys a bracing

climate free of moisture. The hottest summer noons are followed by nights which are delightfully cool. Tuberculosis experts who have visited the Sanatorium have admired this excellent site and its healthy environs. In the initial stage the Sanatorium had only 32 beds, insufficient living quarters, small laboratory, scanty arrangement of water supply, a power house, 100 milli-ampere X-Ray plant, a few surgical instruments, a dispensary and one Tuberculosis specialist. With this meager infrastructure the Sanatorium made a humble beginning.

The necessary roads within the Sanatorium had also to be constructed by the Mission. It was a difficult job to do all this as the money at the disposal of the monks was almost entirely consumed in building up and organizing the unit even on a small scale. Naturally, therefore, the question of meeting the actual running expenses of the infant institution caused considerable anxiety in the beginning.

While the scheme was in the process of being implemented, it was proposed to have a 60 bed-Sanatorium with a small After-Care Colony and a smaller infirmary attached to it, so that service to the Tuberculosis Patients could be rendered on a fairly comprehensive basis. But financial stringency stood in the way of giving effect to the scheme.

### **1.3 Providential Help; An Inspiring Episode:**

A little after a couple of months of the opening of the Sanatorium, a young Calcutta barrister, who had inherited a huge ancestral property, was haunted by the tears of the ill-fated millions; his wife too had similar feelings. They thought it would be wise to give away their surplus wealth to the service of the needy. They asked themselves, 'Is it not a crime to have more than what one needs while millions of people are dying for a little?' These humanitarian considerations inspired them to distribute their wealth. The young man handed over the whole of the immovable ancestral property to the Ramakrishna Mission. Thanks to the nobleness of his mind, for unlike common gifts, this magnificent gift was unconditional.

#### **1.4 Present Position & Activities:**

By the relentless efforts of Revered Swami Vedantanandaji Maharaj, the founder Secretary and his monastic brothers like Revered Swami Atmasthanandaji Maharaj (who later became the 15th President of the Ramakrishna Math and the Ramakrishna Mission) and others the institution grew within a few years into a full-fledged Sanatorium with staff quarters, departments like Dairy Farm to meet the needs of the patients. Water supply system was established by constructing a Dam over an adjacent streamlet with connecting pipelines, Filtration Plant and overhead Tanks.

The Sanatorium has significantly expanded since its inception and currently functions under the following major heads:

- **Medical Services**
- **Support Services**
- **Educational Services**
- **Welfare Services**
- **Spiritual and Cultural Services**

#### **2.0 Medical Services:**

Medical services are now offered through three primary departments – the IPD or ‘In-Patient Department’ and the OPD or ‘Out-Patient Department’ and MMU or Mobile Medical Unit. Brief descriptions of the activities of these departments are given below:

#### **2.1 In-Patient Department (IPD):**

This department provides dedicated indoor treatment for TB and has 200 (Two Hundred) functional beds for treatment of patients who come from all parts of Ranchi District as well as from far - off areas of Jharkhand. TB eradication drive is now being pursued mainly through DOTS (Directly Observed

Treatment, Short Course) which is a national programme. But there are many TB patients in Jharkhand who are so famished and poor that they cannot take advantage of DOTS. These are the most vulnerable patients who require sustained in-door treatment with medicine and nutrition which our Sanatorium offers. Diagnosis here is made mainly on clinical grounds through sputum examination as well as X-Ray. The hospital has a well-fitted Pathology section and a Radiology section for diagnostic purpose.

The seriously ill TB patients often have other associated health problems like severe protein energy malnutrition, liver function impairment, severe anemia, respiratory distress due to extensive lung damage, repeated bouts of malaria, addiction to alcohol etc. Such patients in serious conditions cannot tolerate the usual doses of Anti-Tubercular Treatment or ATT. So the doses have to be adjusted according to their body weight (the weight of many adult patients who come to the Sanatorium ranges between 25 and 35 kilos). Many elderly patients who have come under category II of WHO (World Health Organization) classification cannot tolerate Streptomycin well. These patients and others, who develop side-effects such as hepatitis due to ATT have to be very closely monitored in an institution under the care and guidance of duly qualified doctors and some seriously ill patients require intravenous fluids, oxygen therapy etc., which cannot be provided under DOTS regime.

The hospital has physicians who specialize in treatment of TB and associated diseases. Further, Indoor patients are given health education in all aspects of TB, such as required duration of treatment, hazards of discontinuing it, prevention of spreading TB to others by regular intake of drugs as per physician's advice etc. Thus trained, the patients understand the importance of taking regular ATT and comply with our instructions even after getting discharged from here. Patients are usually discharged after a period of 3 to 6 months, depending upon factors like sputum conversion, clinical improvement and compliance of the patients. On the whole, all efforts are made to see that TB



patients become sputum negative and complete their course of treatment duly. Data of admitted and discharged patients is given on Table 1 and Bed Occupancy rate of the patients during 2016-2017 is given on Table 2 and of the subsequent years till 2021 March on subsequent tables:

### **2.3 Mobile Medical Unit (MMU):**

In order to extend health-cover to the local populace, the Sanatorium has gradually built up a Mobile Medical Unit (MMU) which targets villages under the districts of Ranchi, Khunti and West Singhbhum of Jharkhand state. The MMU has three centers at places like Indipiri, Bandua and Landup situated at about 50 km, 20 km and 50 km away respectively from the Sanatorium. The MMU currently provides medical cover to several thousands of people spread over 250 villages and the patients are treated at a very minimal cost of Rs 5 per visit.

### **Awareness Programme**

Homoeopathy intervention in public health has been taken up under the Ministry of AYUSH. 3 days in a week our team consisting of a Homoeopathy Doctor and a helper visits different villages, schools and public places around



Ranchi as a part of Homoeopathy medical camp, treats the patients and disburses medicines totally free of cost.

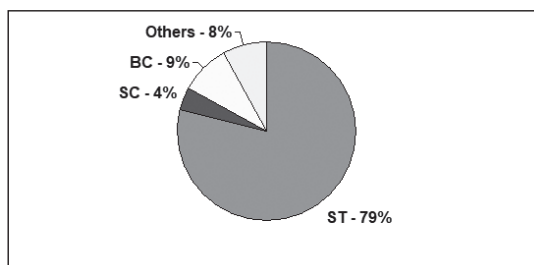

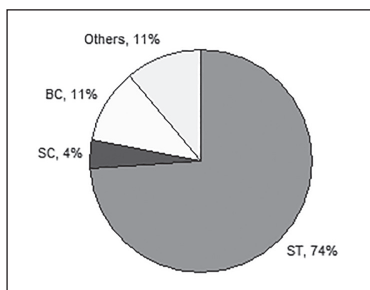
**Figure 2: Caste-wise composition chart in percentage during the year 2016-17**

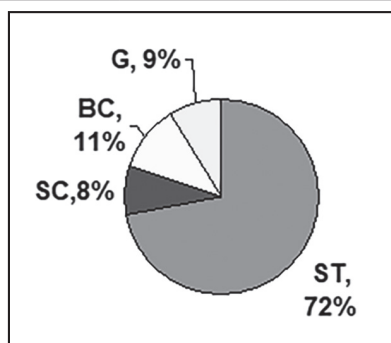


Figure 4: Caste-wise composition chart in percentage during the year 2018-19

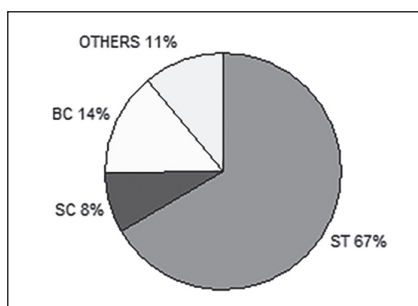


Figure 5: Caste-wise composition chart in percentage during the year 2019-20

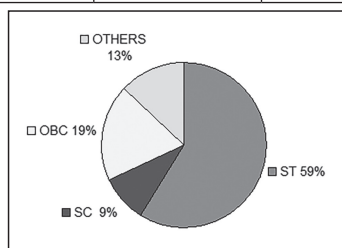


Figure 5: Caste-wise composition chart in percentage during the year 2020-21

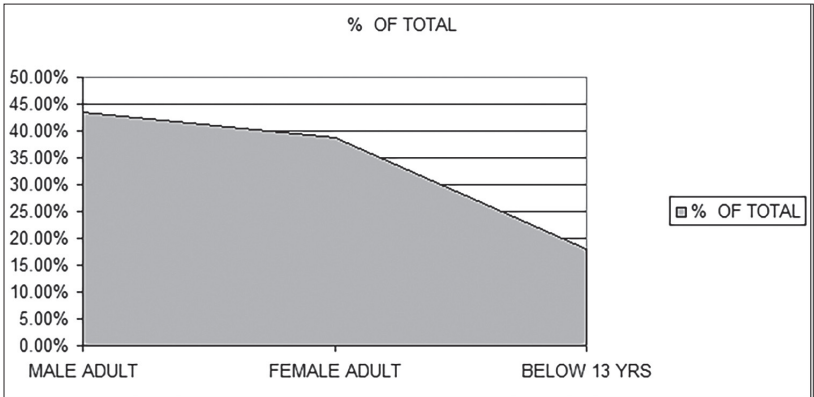

**Figure 6: Distribution of Patients in percentage during the period from 2016-17 to 2020-21**

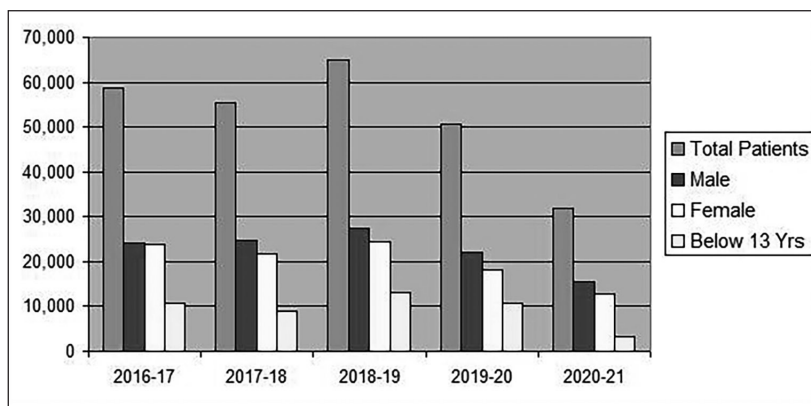


Figure 7: Distribution of Patients during the period from 2016-17 to 2020-21

## EYE CAMP

Second Tuesday of every month an Eye-Camp is being organized at Ramakrishna Mission TB Sanatorium, under which this financial year we had served altogether 858 patients. Out them 49 patients have been operated for cataract in our Sanatorium Eye O.T. under the generous funding of Satya Narayan Poddar Charitable Trust, Ranchi (M/s Premsons Group, Ranchi). For BPL card holders cataract surgery is done totally free of cost.

### 3.0 Support Services

**3.1 Water system:** As already mentioned, a natural reservoir, sufficiently large, has been created by building a Dam across rivulet Nahaksinga. The natural reservoir has an intake device to feed water to a complete water treatment plant which

supplies 2,25,000 liters (50,000 gallons) of potable water per day through well-connected pipelines. It won't be out of the place to mention here that this water treatment plant along with overhead tank and pipelines which were built during sixties of the last century are badly in need of major repair and replacement with better quality to fit the present day standard. Almost the entire system is condemned and underground water is being used with the help of three bore wells presently as a makeshift arrangement.

**3.2 Agro-farm:** We are happy to inform you that after a lapse of almost five to six years (till July 2019) the Agro-farm Department of the Sanatorium is thriving with life and enthusiasm once again. We are very much hopeful about the future of this Department provided that, it is handled with proper planning, pro-activeness and passion. To add to this, ***Ramakrishna Sarovar***; a 90 X 50 X 4.5 meter water reservoir dug during 2019-20 has filled up to its brim, thanks to timely rains during past two years due to reduction of pollution levels all over the globe due to Covid 19 lockdowns.

The cultivable lands of the Sanatorium are covered with different kinds of crops and are a great treat for the eyes to watch. Both the monastic inmates and patients are enjoying home grown produces which are definitely more healthier as well as tastier than the purchased products. During the year 20-21 we had an exceedingly good crop of Paddy which was about 40 tons. Other crops like Ginger, Turmeric, Tomato, Green vegetables, Gourd, Plantain and Yam etc. were also grown in our fields. One of the best services this Department is offering is that sizeable amount of poor people from the neighboring villages are getting job opportunities and earn their livelihood for nearly several months in an year.

**3.3 Dairy farm:** Nutritious food intake is one of the most essential requirements for the speedy recovery of TB patients. With this idea a regular Dairy was set up in the campus of the Sanatorium called 'Goshala' way back in 1959. Slowly the milk production went up and it has enabled us to meet the needs



of the staff members and their families including children. The neighboring villagers had no other facility to procure milk from the vicinity; hence they also approached the Sanatorium for supply of fresh milk from the 'Goshala'. Nowadays 'Goshala' caters to the requirements of in-patients, Ashrama, staff and their families, people from neighboring villages and also more than 525 school children every day. The Sanatorium has developed a few plots of land for growing grass and green fodder for the cows. It has separate grazing fields also where cows are let off twice in a day to enjoy the green open fields. The health of the cows is regularly monitored by a visiting veterinary surgeon. The Dairy produces on an average 250 liters of milk per day.

**3.4 Plantation:** Since its inception, plantation was taken as a holistic creed in the Sanatorium and over the years a lot of varieties of trees like Deodar, Eucalyptus, Teak, Gulmohar, Gamhar, Amaltas, Karanj, Pine, Muchkunda, Nagalingam, Mango, Jackfruit, Lichi, Jamun, Jacaranda, Ashoka, Neem etc. have grown in addition to the Sal forest adding a unique beauty to the landscape. To help the TB patients breathe fresh air and to provide sylvan surroundings, the Sanatorium has developed, on its own, an extensive growth of Sal woods which stand out as an attractive diversion point for visitors. The unique nature of the plantation programme of the Sanatorium is that it is not in any way event-oriented or time-dependent but a routine exercise in protecting the ecology and giving shape to a vibrant vision. The Sanatorium has a good orchard. It has varieties of fruit plants like Mango, Jackfruit, Jamun, Guava, Lichi, Peach, Pear, Lemon, Ber etc. Flower plants, both perennial and seasonal are plenty in Sanatorium Garden. Lilies, Jasmine, Hibiscus, Gardenia, Bougainvillea, Allamenda, Antigonon, Campsis, Clitoria, Jarul, Ipomia, Quisqualis (Madhavi), Jacaranda, Magnolia, Champaka, Muchkunda, Bakul, Gulancha, (Plumeria), Gulmohar, Amaltas, Oleandar, Rangon (Ixora), Belle (Rai), Night queen etc. are grown in abundance. Seasonal flowers like Marigold, Zenia, Dalhia, Chrysanthemum, Southern Belle and some other flowers are

grown in their respective seasons.

### **3.5 Herbal Garden (Under the Ministry of AYUSH):**

Throughout the world cutting age technology has become blessing to the field of alternate medicine. Slowly and steadily alternate medicine is getting its footing among the medical fraternity and people are opting more and more for treatment with the help of this branch of human knowledge. Government of India too took initiatives to promote this age old systems of medicine prevalent in our country - Ayurveda, Naturopathy etc. About 140 varieties of medicinal plants have been planted to develop Herbal Garden under the Ministry of AYUSH covering three different plots of about 3 acres of land.

- 4. Educational Service:** Swami Vivekananda during his lifetime had resolutely preached in his thunderous voice and unobstructed vision that education alone could reverse the multifaceted evils of the society. He urged his brave followers to give back to the ignorant and the poor their lost individuality. In keeping with his exhortation, the Ramakrishna Mission TB Sanatorium, in addition to its primary task of serving the Tuberculosis patients, had started the Vivekananda Madhya Vidyalyaya in the Centenary Year of Swamiji. The school has at present about 460 students who are mostly local residents. Besides studying their prescribed curriculum, they are receiving at the school character-building education which is the need of the hour. Presently the school is a Jharkhand Government Institution, but the Sanatorium maintains the school and is associated with its welfare in an intimate manner.

- 4.1 Tailoring and Embroidery Training Programme:** We have received financial assistance from SAIL RDCIS for our ongoing Tailoring and Embroidery Training Programme. Due to Covid 19 training program was not held during this period. After completion of the training they would be provided with tailoring machines, pico machines, over-locking machines, furniture and raw materials like clothes, buttons, threads, needles, measuring tapes, scissors etc. to

earn their livelihood.

**4.2 National Youth Day:** The 37<sup>th</sup> National Youth Day on 12<sup>th</sup> January 2021 Tuesday was a very short one due to Covid 19 restrictions. In the morning Swami Vivekananda's statue was garlanded and monks offered the flowers to Swamiji. Children of GAP had sung song on Swamiji and Swami Satsangananda had addressed the small gathering consisting of a few staff members, some of the IPD patients and GAP Students. Sri Ajay Thakur had read the Swadesh Mantra of Swami Vivekananda.

**4.3 Republic Day :** The Republic Day celebrations were also very much curtailed due to Covid 19 restrictions. At 9.00am the flag hoisting was done followed by the National Anthem.

**4.6 Library:** Library being an effective instrument of disseminating knowledge, the Sanatorium has been conducting library service from three sub-locations - one for the residents and devotees at the Ashrama and one each for the medical personnel and indoor patients and the other at the Computer Centre. The Library has at present 4740 books, and receives 21 periodicals; it also keeps 10 newspapers and 382 CDs.

**5.0 Spiritual & Cultural Service:** The Ashrama, as part of its regular religious and spiritual activities, conducts formal worship and daily prayers in the quiet atmosphere of the Shrine in which monks, brahmacharis and the devotees participate. This apart, Tithipujas of Sri Ramakrishna, Holy Mother Sarada Devi, and Swami Vivekananda, birthdays of monastic disciples of Sri Ramakrishna are celebrated round the year. In tune with the catholic and universal attitude of Sri Ramakrishna, the Ashrama also celebrates in a befitting manner the Buddha Purnima, Christmas Eve, and Pujas such as Saraswati Puja, Shiva Ratri, Janmashtami, Ramnavami and Jagaddhatri Puja duly. The Jagaddhatri Puja, in particular, is celebrated in a very grand manner through a day-long programme in the Ashrama with all

the solemnities. Jagaddhatri Puja is in vogue for more than past four decades. Much of the credit of performing the Puja successfully goes to the staff and their family members. Local people and devotees also come forward with donation and provide many items necessary for the celebration. Besides such regular formal worship and celebrations, the Ashrama also conducts scripture classes to give spiritual food to the spiritual aspirants. It also arranges from time to time Bhakta Sammelan and Mantra Diksha for the benefit of the local spiritual aspirants. Due to the ensuing Covid 19 pandemic all the above mentioned Puja celebrations were restricted as per the guidelines of the Government during the period.

- 5.1 Jagaddhatri Puja:** Due to the ensuing Covid 19 pandemic all over the globe and the strict lockdown enforced by the Central as well as the State Governments, Jagaddhatri Puja which has been one of the most important events in the annals of Sanatorium for past 6 decades or so, could not be celebrated with the same pomp and gaiety with which it has been celebrated through the decades. Because of the restrictions the attending participants were limited to inmates of Sanatorium and a few neighboring villages only.
- 5.2 Karma Puja:** Karma Puja is a tribal festival which we have been celebrating at the Sanatorium for past several decades. And again here, due to the Covid 19 pandemic and resulting lockdown Puja was done in a restricted way and with minimum participants.
- 6.0 Welfare Service:** The Sanatorium's activities are not confined to medical and associated services only. It also conducts on a regular basis a number of welfare services for the local people. Brief descriptions of such activities are given below:
- 6.1 Distribution of Cloth, Blankets, Garments etc:** We distributed the following items to the poor people at needy villages in Ranchi, Khunti, and East Singhbhum District of

**6.2 Covid-19 Relief work:** The world is reeling very badly under the devastating effects of Corona Virus (Covid-19) pandemic disease. As we all know our country too imposed long duration of Lockdown in different phases to curb the disease; but poor people, especially the daily laborers have to bear the brunt of this. To mitigate their suffering to some extent the Ramakrishna Mission TB Sanatorium conducted Relief work among these marginalized people in remote villages as well as some of the slums of the Ranchi city under the direct guidance of the Headquarters. In this Relief work we have distributed food items - uncooked, cooked - and some daily provisions worth of Rs. 4 lakh ( Approx.) among 650 poor families.

**6.3 Gadadhar Abhyudaya Prakalpa (GAP):** Under the project 'Gadadhar Abhyudaya Prakalpa' 105 children below 12 years of age are given non-formal education. This is a humble effort of serving the poor and needy children from in and around the Sanatorium and continuing its services satisfactorily. Children are getting free milk with nutritious Tiffin every day. Along with the Study materials, Uniforms and Toiletry Items children undergo regular health-checkups and supplied with all medical assistance free of cost. But due to Covid 19 and its ensuing restrictions the regular classes which would be held daily was abandoned.

## 7.0 Sanatorium on the March:

**7.1 Inauguration of the New IPD Block:** The long awaited inauguration of the 50 bedded Indoor Patient Department for general patients was finally done on February 27, 2021 by Smt Droupadi Murmi, the then Honorable Governor of Jharkhand. The Honorable Governor inaugurated and dedicated the new building for the services of the people of Ranchi and other parts of the state in the august presence of Dignitaries from the state government and officials of RVNL, New Delhi.

It was intended to be inaugurated in the May 2020. But due to the Covid 19 pandemic the world had come to a total standstill in an unimaginable way. This inordinately delayed the completion and furnishing of new wards.

This newly constructed block is a sure and determined step



towards the new vision and planning of the Sanatorium, where we would gradually come out of Sanatorium pattern and moving towards a full-fledged General Hospital in near future. This block is fitted with advanced modern facilities to meet the present-day expectation of both the medical fraternity as well as the beneficiaries. With the induction of this department charitable activities of the Sanatorium would accommodate economically backward patients having general ailments other than Tuberculosis. It has come into existence with the financial assistance of Railway Vikas Nigam Ltd. Delhi, under its CSR programme.

**7.2 Small step to a Giant leap:** Lack of modern facilities as well as paucity of space was the long-felt problem with the present makeshift Out Patient Department within the ward of the TB Sanatorium. It is felt that the vision of a full-fledged General Hospital won't work unless and until a well-equipped and spacious separate OPD block with modern facilities is built. With this plan we approached the Railway Vikas Nigam Ltd. Delhi, and they too welcomed the idea and sanctioned the project for the financial year 2020-21. Here again the Covid 19 and ensuing lockdown severely curtailed the progress of the construction of this building. We sincerely hope that by the end of financial year 2021-22 new OPD building will become functional for the services.

**7.3 Conservation and enhancement of Sanatorium:** The Sanatorium is fortunate enough to have 283 acres of land, out of which majority of land is forest, which is habitat for hundreds of species of flora-fauna. Our campus is unprotected without a boundary wall, which is why there is a constant threat of disruptive activities and destruction of forest life and environment. Arresting deforestation is the need of the hour which is the important lesson we all learnt from the Corona Virus pandemic. To address these issues, need for a high-raised boundary wall was long-felt and our Headquarter endorsed this plan, but it could not actualize since last few decades due to various factors.

Fortunately enough this year we started constructing boundary wall on the south-west side of campus which is towards the dam starting from Old School building (GAP building at present) at a cost of Rs. 1,800 per running feet. We are very happy to inform you that about 2000 running feet of compound wall has been completed so far up to the dam. We need a few crores of rupees to complete this monumental at the same time most essential project.

**7.4 Dawn of the new era:** Since last five years the authorities of our Headquarters were pressing the sanatorium to adopt some kind of Renewable Energy System. Electricity bill is the heavy burden on the Sanatorium finance and it constantly keeps on swelling every consequent year. Dr. S.P. GonChaudhuri, Hony. President, NB Institute for Rural Technology Sanatorium has come out with a plan of constructing a 75KV Solar-Hydro Hybrid Power plant at our present Dam site. This **Hybrid Solar-Hydro Power Plant** would be one of its own kinds in the entire country and would be a source of inspiration to others. Construction work is going on and expected to be completed by the end of this 2020-21. (But again here due to Covid 19 the progress of this project has been delayed very much) We are happy to note that, here again the Railway Vikas Nigam Ltd. Delhi has come forward to our help in financing this project.

Along with this we had already installed 95KV Hybrid Solar Power Plant mounted on the roof of the newly constructed IPD block and Monks quarters which is already in functioning mode. Once the **Solar-Hydro Hybrid Power Plant** starts functioning, the Sanatorium would be operating fully on renewable energy and it would be a model to the entire region.

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2. To objects of the Association are:

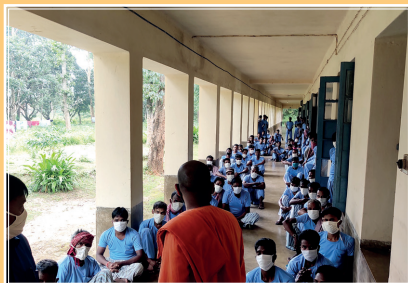
